At the beginning of March there was not one Video Conferencing meeting on the meetings database @aa.org.au. By the end of April there were close to 1000! A small band of volunteers in each region made all the changes to the database as more and more meetings embraced the new technology. That AA was able to attract newcomers to the new format, and for them to remain sober without face to face meetings, is a miracle in itself. Our members pivoted

and lives were saved. So, now that we are mostly back to face to face meetings it's nice to sit back and "feel the serenity"

GSO Finances

The onset of the global pandemic earlier this year has caused financial problems for many AA entities, both here in Australia and overseas. There are two main sources of income from the GSO Australia, being 7th Tradition Donations (55%) and sales of Literature (45%). Both of these experienced significant drops in the first half of the year. A call for members to support GSO went out which led to a big rise in personal donations, which kept the GSO afloat and ensured all the services GSO provides were able to be maintained.

It did, however, give cause to rethink the way we calculate our Prudent Reserve and how many months it should be

The Reserve Fund is G.S.O.'s Prudent Reserve. Its principal purpose is to provide the financial

resources to continue the essential services of G.S.O. for up to a period of 12-16 months in the event of an unexpected and substantial reduction in the normal revenues of the organization.

Our current Prudent Reserve total sits at 9.36 months.

As you can see, at we are not out of the woods yet.

As a fellowship we strive to attain the Prudent Reserve goal to ensure AA's long-term viability.

Sunshine Coast AA powers through with PI lunch

With a year that has been so unpredictable and AA going through such amazing changes, there was many doubts about this event being held. As the year pressed on along with the lifting of restrictions. It was wonderful to see that District 9 Sunshine Coast fellowship along with support from Area B NER Qld was able to move forward with the Professional's Awareness Luncheon, held on the 25th of November 2020 at the Maroochydore RSL on the Sunshine Coast.

This was my first time attending an event like this and it was an experience to be had. There was an attendance of 49 professionals, 21 AA members and 3 Al-Anon members at the event, it was a breath of fresh air after the year we have had. The AA members covered their own expense for the meals, whilst the 52 guests where covered by District 9. There were Doctors, Police, Counsellors and numerous other organisations spanning through the Community Sector in attendance on the day.

Brian. F opened the event with explaining what AA does and doesn't do when

working in with professionals. Jack Ellison who is a Mental Health Worker and a long-time friend of AA spoke about his experience with the AA in the professional field, and how he has found it beneficial having AA working closely with professionals. The day was followed through with a talk from John G and Jane from Al-Anon, the room was buzzing with chatter with some of the professionals speaking about how it surprised them that AA funds themselves and we don't want anything. I spoke with a few members afterwards and they stated that this was also their first event, and they were impressed with the number of professionals that attended and how well the day came together.

Brian F has received quite a few very complimentary text msgs re the Luncheon and the Police Inspector who attended has requested that he goes and talk to the "Police Venerable Persons Unit". Dr John Miles who is one of the leading Psychiatrists for Qld Health on Sunshine Coast sent this email to Brian F "I would just like to say thank you for the very informative and enjoyable luncheon, It was great to hear about the good work of AA and it has

certainly given me ideas to take forward in my clinical practice".

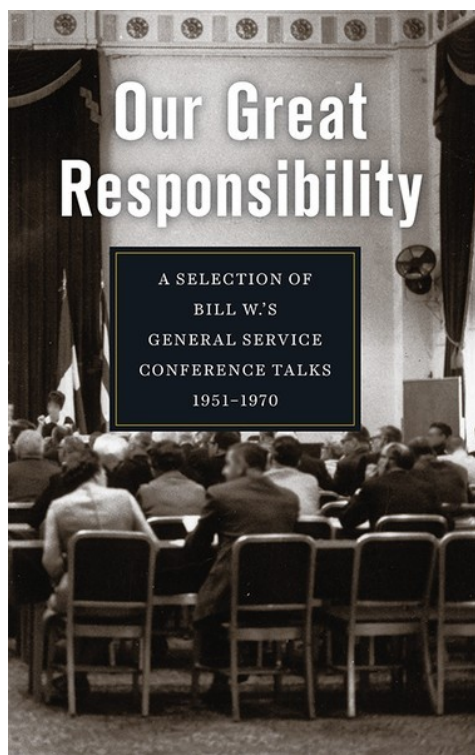

Our Great Responsibility

This new AA book brings together fifteen of Bill W's talks to the North American General Service Conferences between 1951 and 1970. The book is illustrated with fascinating photos and facsimiles from the archives as well as helpful footnotes that clarify the people and contemporary issues that Bill was talking about.

The talks cover serious topics—such as Trust and Service—but along the way Bill provides fascinating insights, in a consistently self-effacing way, into the early history of AA. The transcripts suggest he liked to seem as if he was speaking off the cuff but these talks reveal that deep thought and consideration went into the messages he wanted to convey.

Readers will no doubt find various gems to oversee their service within what Bill calls “A beautiful benign anarchy” but here is one that every trusted servant will identify with: “The more people there are to do a job, it often falls out the less there are. In other words, what’s everybody’s business is nobody’s business.” Similarly, he reminds us that “Loving friendship is a part of...sponsorship.”

Bill’s guidance was practical: in 1956, Bill spoke about the four principles that underlie AA service: Petition, Appeal, Participation and Decision. He believed that “... Conference should never take a serious problem to the grassroots until it knows what its own opinion is, and what the pros and cons of such a problem really are.” He goes further: “It is the function of Conference leadership to instruct the group conscience on the issues concerned.” Bill also bluntly stated that “Our Headquarters can, of course, have no secrets.”

In 1963, Bill warned of the paradox that God will provide for us one day at a time, “...but let us not suppose that he doesn’t expect us to use our capability for making estimates and plans for the future. He endowed us all with prudence, and many of us with the capability of

using it and making good plans and good estimates. So let us try to do this. We shall sometimes fail, but this is better than doing nothing for fear of failing. This, your trusted servant must strive to do.”

In 1965, Bill said “Let us never fear needed change... The essence of all growth is a willingness to change for the better and then an unremitting willingness to shoulder whatever the responsibility, at whatever price.” Bill also reminded us that AA recovery grants us three things: “freedom from a deadly affliction; a life experience that enables you to carry that priceless freedom to others and a vision, ever widening, of God’s reality and of His Love.”

This book is a dry read but if you put any importance on AA staying true to its roots, then Bill’s talks are an invaluable primary source—straight from the horse’s mouth. It is available through your local Central Service Office; find it here: <https://aa.org.au/contact-aa/>

In seeking candidates for Class A Trustee positions, the Board looks for men and women with a proven track record in their own fields, with a demonstrated interest in Alcoholics Anonymous, and some experience in working with AA and its members. It would be safe to say that the busiest people have made the largest contribution and shown the greatest dedication and judgment. From time to time the Board has included members of the medical and nursing professions, accountancy, the Law, researchers, people familiar with the media, as well as those well versed in the general business world. They have all made their various contributions, not only in their own special fields but often also in the wider world of organisational management.

AA’s debt to those who do not share our disease but willingly share our problems is immense, going back to the beginning. Bill W wrote: “In the days when AA was unknown, it was the non-alcoholic Trustees who held up our hands before the general public. They

supplied us with ideas ... They voluntarily spent hours on end, working side by side with us and among the grubbiest of details. They gave freely of their professional and financial

We, in Australia, benefit similarly from their professional experience.

Since they need not maintain anonymity, Class A Trustees are also our public face, should it become necessary to put AA before the general public in any matter. They are often called upon to chair meetings and committees, to speak at Regional Forums and take formal roles at major Conventions.

The Chair of the General Service Board is traditionally a Class A Trustee, partly due to the public aspects of the role, but there have been exceptions where alcoholic Trustees have held the position. The Board will always seek to select the best person available for the task.

wisdom. Now and then they helpfully mediated our difficulties.” Written in 1966, those words hold true today. Nonalcoholic Trustees remain a rich source of wisdom and perspective.

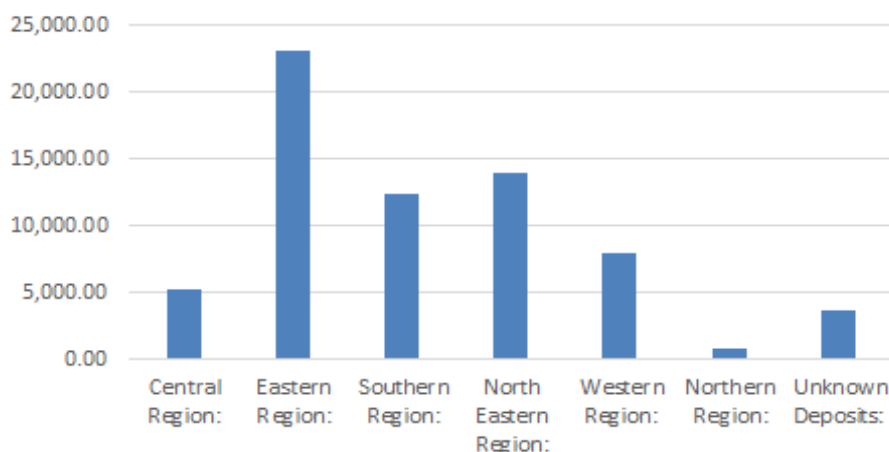
